Law enforcement can inform the District Attorney of the person with OUD/SUD and charges, at which point the person can possibly be connected with an inpatient rehabilitation center, or specialty treatment court. Costs for medication, necessary labs, and personnel related to the dispensing of these medications are assessed by the prison's medical provider through a per diem charge for each participating inmate. A per diem charge is also assessed by the opioid treatment provider furnishing methadone to the project. Costs for a drug and alcohol counselor position specific to this program are also billed to the prison by the medical provider.
